The Knights of the Round Table

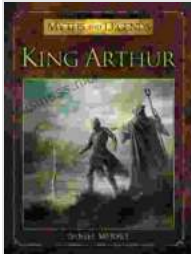

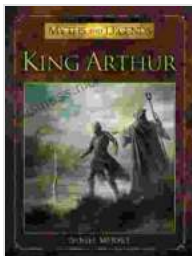

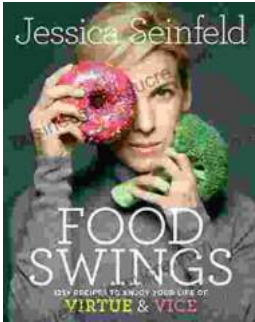
